
Scaling Up with Thinking Skills for Work is in its final year as a National Institute on Disability, Independent Living, and Rehabilitation Research (NIDILLR) Grant. Drs Susan McGurk and Marianne Farkas are the co-PIs. The research project is focusing on ways to improve on already established evidence-based practice. The team is specifically looking at ways to "scale up" adoption by identifying efficiencies in implementation and organizational readiness. A partnership with public mental health providers in Georgia is providing the supported employment staff and clients in this undertaking.

<u>Vocational Peer Support</u> (VPS) a curriculum for those delivering peer support, includes a Trainer's Guide, Trainee Handbook & Toolkit, PowerPoint Slides, and Implementation Guide for Supervisors and Administrators.

<u>Vocational Empowerment Photovoice</u> (VEP) using Photovoice tools to inspire people to consider work, includes a Leader's Guide and Workbook.
