- **Tell:** Before getting started, I will orient you to the materials that will be used during the lesson.
- Ask: Look at the Table of Contents for the Reference Handbook.
- **Tell:** The REFERENCES are printed summaries of important lecture points and examples to be read during the lesson and kept for future reference.
 - PowerPoint SLIDES will be shown on the overhead screen.
 - SLIDES are visual presentations of lecture points and illustrations to view during the lesson.
 - It will be helpful at suggested times to copy information from SLIDES.
- Make the Point: In the Psychiatric Rehabilitation Approach, the practitioner uses two rehabilitation interventions to develop an individual's skills: Direct Skills Teaching and Programming Skill Use.
 - Direct Skills Teaching is the primary skill development intervention.
 - Programming Skill Use is the fourth activity of Direct Skills Teaching. It also may be used independently to improve an individual's skill use.
 - **Tell:** The goal of this lesson is to get an overall picture of Direct Skills Teaching.
 - **Ask:** Complete REFERENCE 1 Pre-Training Assessment Form. Put your name on the form. Answer the questions as best you can.
 - **Collect:** Completed REFERENCE 1.
- **Make the Point:** Direct Skills Teaching has the goal of enabling people to learn the skills that are necessary for success in a specific environment.

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Tell: The name of the intervention, Direct Skills Teaching, was carefully chosen to reflect the major characteristics of the intervention.

Ask: What do you think the term *Direct* reflects about the intervention?

Discuss: Several answers.

• The intervention is direct in that the practitioner purposefully prepares learning experiences for the person.

• Direct Skills Teaching is different from more haphazard ways of teaching psychiatrically disabled individuals, such as modeling desired behaviors or discussion groups.


• Direct Skills Teaching is a focused intervention that has a clearly stated goal of skill learning and deliberate instructional activities to reach that goal.

Ask: What do you think the term *Skills* reflects about the intervention?

Discuss: Several answers.

Make the Point: The intervention is focused on teaching skills.

Ask: Read REFERENCE 2 – Example: Skills.




Show: SLIDE 2 – Characteristics of a Skill. Read aloud the characteristics.

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Make the Point: • A skill is the ability to do something well.

- Direct Skills Teaching is designed to teach skills that are useful (i.e., required to maintain oneself in a particular environment).
- Skills are stated using straightforward, active verbs.
- Ask: Read REFERENCE 3 Explanation of the Characteristics of a Skill.



Explain: The way in which each skill example displays all the characteristics of a skill.

- **Make the Point:** There are three types of skills: physical skills, emotional skills, and intellectual skills.
 - A physical skill primarily requires bodily activity.
 - An emotional skill primarily requires interpersonal or intrapersonal activity.
